Michael Moorcock is a prolific writer of more than eighty works of fiction and non-fiction, and the creator of such memorable characters as Elric, Jerry Cornelius and Colonel Pyat. In 1956, at the age of 16, he became editor of Tarzan Adventures and later edited The Sexton Blake Library and the controversial and ground-breaking UK science fiction magazine New Worlds.

Michael has won numerous awards, including the Guardian Fiction Prize for The Condition of Muzak, and his novel Mother London was shortlisted for the Whitbread Prize. He has won the Prix Utopiales for Lifetime Achievement, the Grand Master Award from the Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers of America, as well as the Bram Stoker Lifetime Achievement Award. In 2008 Michael Moorcock was named as one of the '50 greatest British writers since 1945' by The Times.
